From the Rector **Away from it all or with it?**

Traditionally August is the month in which, like many institutions, activities desist for a while and holidays are taken. It is good to have a break from the routine and the ordinary occasionally, to see different perspectives, ways of life; to visit friends and to take a breather – rest and reflect upon one's life. If you are getting away this month, or are on holiday in this area I hope it is a chance for you to experience a healthy mixture of these various things.

Many people, on returning from holiday, find it difficult to get back into the groove of working after being off for a week or two. After a while, however, there is a sense of relief at being back "into the rhythm" again. While it is good to be away and see things differently for a while, the familiar can be reassuring and comforting. It is for this very reason that we often want the church to be a place of continuity in an ever-changing world – the one place where timeless truths are maintained and re-echoed around.

But this is not to devalue that holiday experience in which we can fall in love with another way of life, and perhaps another self that we find when free of the hurly burly and rush of daily commitments. Jesus is often recorded in the Bible as retreating from the crowds to pray and be quiet, to rest and be alone with his heavenly Father. In following his example, we can also try to find the away-from-it-all in the middle of our daily business. After all, the God who created the universe created work and rest and we can discover that creating presence in all parts of our lives.

As if to remind us of this dilemma we have, at the end of this month, a huge fund-raising day on 31st August. The St Faith's Town Fair is a joint venture with the Town Centre Partnership (consisting of, amongst other, local businesses and the Market Co-operative) in which we will host stalls and activities in and around the church. Please come along to support and if you can spare some of your precious time, help with one of the activities. And to spur us on in our efforts we hope to see the restoration works begin this month, so you can see the fruits of your labours.

Hugh and Alinda Elliott

A Memorial Plaque to Hugh and Alinda has recently been put on the south wall of the Nave, donated by daughter Janet MacFarlane and her loving family. We thought it would be nice to remember them also in "Faith Matters".

Hugh was born in New Malden, Surrey, moving to Portsmouth in 1931. Living three doors away from him was Alinda Sevens, who was born in Winchester. They met when they were both 16 years old when attending Ascension Church in Stubbington Avenue and married in the same church in 1939.

Hugh attended Kelham Theological College in Nottinghamshire, intending to enter the Church. War intervened and instead he joined the RAF, serving with great distinction and rising to the rank of Squadron Leader. After the war, he joined the RAF Volunteer Reserve, Hugh and Alinda moved back to Portsmouth and Hugh enrolled in the Bognor Teacher Training College in 1947. They moved to Portchester in 1949, where they both became very active members of St Mary's Church, Hugh serving several years as churchwarden and Alinda being active as a "flower lady", participating in the village Gala and as a member of Toc H.

Hugh had a fine teaching career, being Head of four schools in Portsmouth. He did much for young people, opening and running youth clubs, taking disadvantage youngsters away to summer camps, and forming the 2197 Squadron of the Air Training Corps at Portsea Modern School for Boys.

Hugh and Alinda moved to Havant in the 1960s and both played an active part in St Faith's Church. Alinda was a member of the Mothers Union, was a "flower lady" in the church, a leading light in the Emsworth Flower Club and a cook of distinction.

Hugh served as churchwarden at St Faith's from 1978 until 1995. Alinda developed a rare bone cancer and bore her illness with enormous courage until her death, after major surgery. Hugh was devastated but continued his work for St Faith's. He died in 2000 after a long illness, during which he steadfastly maintained his attendance at St Faith's, often in considerable pain.

Janet is a special lady, with great pride in her parents, and her Plaque will keep the memory of Hugh and Alinda alive in St Faith's Church.

Parochial Church Council Reports

Building Committee 4 July

Southlands lease on No 2 finished on 30 June and they had vacated the property. The new Verger, Vickie Mockford and husband Neil would redecorate the house, including replastering in places and would do any gardening required. The Parish would pay for the cost of materials. Nos 2/4 North Street were both occupied and the lease with Southlands for the Flat above was close to completion. Negotiations continued with the Halifax concerning dilapidations. The rent of Christ Church Centre was being formally reviewed.

The work on St Nicholas Chapel was almost finished. Remedial action was being taken to repair the wall of a downstairs room in Church House. The windows smashed by vandals were being replaced by unbreakable polycarbonate ones, covered by our insurance claim. The tree in front of Coach House would be crowned on the advice of the Council Tree Specialist. The First Part of the Health and Safety Handbook had been drafted.

Fabric Committee 6 July

"Sound Advice" of Fareham were being asked to demonstrate their equipment in church. There had been delay in the repair of the West Door damaged by vandals but the wall, also damaged by them, adjacent to the Lady Chapel had been repaired by Bob Wilson. The revised cost of the Restoration work was now £54,765 including Architect's fees. The approval of the Diocese for the work had been received and a public notice was displayed inside and outside church. It was hoped that work would start in mid-August. The Restoration Appeal now stood at over £16,000.


The organ blower needed repair or replacement at a cost of anything up to £4,000. Donations totalling £1,500 towards the cost had been made by two parishioners. St Faith's would register an interest in having a Telecom Mast, attached to the Tower, which could earn the parish up to £10,000 annually. Further information would be sought. Wallbridge & Co of Salisbury were being asked to undertake the annual testing of the Lightning Conductors.

PCC Meeting 8 July

Reports were considered from the Treasurer, Building and Fabric Committees, St Nicholas Chapel, the Hall Manager, Restoration Committee, and Child Protection Officer. Reports were also given of the Deanery and Diocesan Synods and Churches Together. It was agreed that a letter should go to the Chief Executive of the Halifax to ask for his help to expedite the current negotiations about 2/4 North Street. The Rector's Resolution on "Remarriage of Persons Once Previously Divorced" was further discussed. The caretaking and cleaning arrangements for Church and Hall would be discussed with all who are currently involved in them after the new Verger, Vickie Mockford, arrives on 1 August. A Resolution was passed approving the schedule of restoration work to the Church.



{Alternate points of view on this or other subjects, contentious or otherwise, are always welcome in Faith Matters - John does need someone to make the other side of a discussion! Ed.}

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

About 8 of us have met on a regular basis whilst others have joined us when they were able. Susan introduced us to the writings of Emmet Fox, an American Theologian. And we began reading his book "The Sermon On the Mount". We found the style of writing very old fashioned, not surprisingly because it was written sometime in the 1930's. At other times we have disagreed with his interpretations of certain aspects of the Sermon.

Reading and discussing each chapter has I think challenged us to look more closely at our own personal understanding of the Sermon On the Mount, as well as learning from each other of another understanding of the meaning of Christ's teachings. One thing we are unanimous in saying is that Emmet Fox has been irritating, challenging and obscure at times, but despite being irritated and challenged by his writings we have continued reading and discussing. I am not sure whether that is due to his compelling writing or to our own tenacity!

During Lent we stopped reading Emmet Fox and instead studied "The Pilgrimage of Return". That brought us closer to examine ourselves in depth of feeling and thought to our personal relationship with God. We shared many special moments with one another and we thank God for allowing us that opportunity.

However we have enjoyed many good debates and laughs over the year. And now we are looking forward to continuing our fellowship after the summer break, we meet on the first Tuesday of September 8pm at the Rectory. We hope to start with a new title at the New Year. CS

Statement of Significance

When we apply to the Diocese for a "faculty" to add or change something in the church, we have to send a short "Statement of Significance", explaining the historical development of the church and the important features that contribute to its character. The following is our statement:

"St Faith's Church is in the centre of Havant. There has been a church on this site for nine centuries. The parish has a civil electoral role of 7,146. St Faith's is the principal church within the Havant Deanery and is used for special services including Remembrance Day, Civic Sunday, Holocaust Memorial Day, and HMS Havant Memorial Service. The parish church was dedicated in the eleventh century to St Faith, the girl martyr of Aquitaine. It is a Grade 2* listed building of some splendour and is perhaps the most important architectural feature in Havant. Nothing now remains of the original Saxon or Norman churches, although it is likely that some of the existing stonework is older material reused. In 1832 when the church was being repaired, it was found to be built on part of a Roman foundation, so there is a possibility that some brickwork is Roman.

The oldest part of the church is the chancel which was built in the 13th century. The present windows in the chancel were installed in the 14th century, when another storey was added to the tower and a vestry built on the north-east bay of the chancel. Some other alterations were made in the 15th century and the church remained as it was until the 19th century. In 1832, the nave was found to be very unsafe; it was taken down and replaced. This was not a complete success because in 1870 it was discovered that this work had seriously weakened the tower. Over the next five years the whole of the western end of the church was remodelled, the tower extensively rebuilt, and a north porch added. This and other work at that time resulted in the present building.

There is much to see and admire within the church including one of the most recent additions - a statue depicting our patron St Faith, installed in memory of the late Miss Doris "Norkie" Norkett who gave many years of devoted service to the church. The fine Lady Chapel in the south transept, designed by Sir Charles Nicholson, was the generous gift of the late Captain Boyd Richardson, R.N., as a memorial to his mother and was dedicated in 1936.

Hanging in the church since its presentation at a formal parade in 1799 is the colour of the Loyal Havant Volunteers. There are many monuments around the church and the stained glass windows are also of interest, particularly the last three additions. These are a window on the north side commemorating the valiant service of HMS Havant, sunk at Dunkirk, a window at the west end depicting Our Lady of Lourdes in memory of Christopher Nias and a window just inside the north door in memory of the faithful service to the church of Bob Grant."

So there you have it; a church of special significance but we have left out the people who make it significant - the Rector and you the parishioners.

After Quasimodo's death, the bishop of the Cathedral of Notre Dame sent word through the streets of Paris that a new bell ringer was needed. The bishop decided that he would conduct the interviews personally and went up into the belfry to begin the screening process. After observing several applicants demonstrate their skills, he had decided to call it a day.

Just then, an armless man approached him and announced that he was there to apply for the bell ringer's job. The bishop was incredulous. "You have no arms!" "No matter," said the man. "Observe!" And he began striking the bells with his face, producing a beautiful melody on the carillon. The bishop listened in astonishment; convinced he had finally found a replacement for Quasimodo. But suddenly, rushing forward to strike a bell, the armless man tripped and plunged headlong out of the belfry window to his death in the street below. The stunned bishop rushed to his side. When he reached the street, a crowd had gathered around the fallen figure, drawn by the beautiful music they had heard only moments before.

As they silently parted to let the bishop through, one of them asked, "Bishop, who was this man?". I don't know his name," the bishop sadly replied, "but his face rings a bell".


The following day, despite the sadness that weighed heavily on his heart due to the unfortunate death of the armless campanologist, the bishop continued his interviews for the bell ringer of Notre Dame. The first man to approach him said, "Your Excellency, I am the brother of the poor armless wretch that fell to his death from this very belfry yesterday. I pray that you honour his life by allowing me to replace him in this duty".

The bishop agreed to give the man an audition, and, as the armless man's brother stooped to pick up a mallet to strike the first bell, he groaned, clutched at his chest, twirled around, and died on the spot.

Two monks, hearing the bishop's cries of grief at this second tragedy, rushed up the stairs to his side. "What has happened? Who is this man?" the first monk asked breathlessly. "I don't know his name," sighed the distraught bishop, "but he's a dead ringer for his brother".
